## Health and safety at universities in the light of the Bologna process

The Bologna process can be viewed as an opportunity to react to societal change and the new challenges of the knowledge-based society by introducing structural changes. These include the introduction of bachelor and masters qualifications, modularised courses, continuous evaluation and implementation of the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS).

What is the impact of these structural reforms on health and safety at universities? What consequences do they have for university teachers, students and also administrative staff? The second conference "Safe and healthy universities" in Dresden will analyse the impact of the Bologna reforms on health and safety at universities from a national and a European perspective. It will try to identify possible ways of ensuring that the unintended consequences of Bologna can be used productively to enhance health and safety and thus improve the quality of universities.

On Day 1 the conference will look at the challenges and opportunities of the Bologna process for health and safety at universities.

On Day 2 the focus will be on possible solutions at the organisational level. Topics of discussion will include DGUV Regulation 2 and its significance for institutions of tertiary education and also the concept of a health-promoting university in the light of the Bologna process.

Day 3 will be devoted to the question of integrating health and safety into teaching. A combination of internationalisation and Bologna reforms has brought new challenges for university teaching and instruction. Concrete practical examples will be given as to how health and safety can be integrated into study courses leading to the award of bachelor and masters degrees.
